One bride, added Hsu, went for a facial a week before the wedding and got a sunburn. She was scalded when the beautician used hot water in an attempt to extract impurities from her pores.

The injured area turned a deep maroon by the wedding day. Hsu had to ripen in a good manner and make sure the bride was reassuring the panday bride.

Sometimes, couples make unusual requests that we are not willing to spend, said Cindy Chang, creative planner of Nuptia & Co., which specializes in destination weddings.

One couple wanted a wedding in Bali at a five-star hotel with dinner already thrown in for just RM35,000.

"Can you imagine putting that off? We can't get away from people that, will say we are being difficult or are only interested in the big clients," said Chang.
